HURRICANE DEAN Alert No. 2

Americas Relief Team has activated its Emergency Center

Hurricane Dean, which has already claimed at least six lives, continued its path of destruction overnight as it battered Jamaica with winds of up to 145mph uprooting trees and ripping roofs from houses, while there are fears it could gain strength as it heads towards Mexico today.

The following are updates on critical logistics response items:

AIR RELIEF FLIGHTS

At least one air relief flight is being planned to Jamaica, but we have no formal confirmation. Be sure to let us know what your requirements are in the event that we secure space in one or more air relief flights. NGO's aid cargo will be accepted ONLY if they have a receiving & distributing mechanism in place.

CHARTER FLIGHTS

Charter flights for relief operations are available through AmericasRelief Team. Small cargo planes from 10,000 to 40,000 lbs. are available for Jamaica, Yucatan, etc. Larger planes up to DC-3s are also available.

CO-LOADING OF EMERGENCY CARGO

NGO members and others can take advantage of co-loading opportunities. If you have less than a container load of aid cargo. NGO's aid cargo will be accepted ONLY if they have a receiving & distributing mechanism in place.

At this point we are accepting at no cost, aid supplies up to one 40-foot container for co-loading.

KINGSTON (AFP) - Hurricane Dean rampaged towards the tourist beaches of Mexico on Monday, after battering Jamaica into a state of emergency by downing power lines, ripping off roofs and blocking roads with felled trees.

The category four hurricane, packing winds of 150 miles (240 kilometers) per hour which have so far killed at least five people across the Caribbean basin, whipped up giant surf as it headed south of the Cayman Islands for Belize and Mexico's Yucatan peninsula.

Roads were blocked by fallen trees and flooded in the eastern parts of Jamaica, with power cuts affecting thousands of homes.

Jamaican Prime Minister Portia Simpson Miller announced late Sunday that security forces would be granted wider powers after police reported looting across the island.

The state of emergency will be reviewed at a meeting of the Jamaican cabinet later on Monday, but was envisaged for a period of 30 days, and Miller even indicated that national elections on August 27 may be delayed due to Dean.

Mexico was evacuating some 90,000 tourists from the major resort of Cancun and nearby islands of the "Mayan Riviera," as well as some 13,000 workers on more than 140 of its oil platforms in the Gulf of Mexico.

Jamaica's airports have been shut since Saturday, and more than 4,500 people packed into hundreds of shelters opened up by the government around the island amid bitter memories of Hurricane Ivan which killed 14 people in 2004.

Hurricane Dean earlier brushed past Haiti, one of the world's poorest countries, lashing it with heavy rain and gale-force winds. Two people were killed in the southeastern town of Moron and southern Tiburon, Haitian officials said, and more than 1,000 people evacuated from low-lying areas.

Two people were also killed in the French territory of Martinique, while in the Dominican Republic a 16-year-old boy was swept away by huge waves and killed. Authorities there warned of the danger of landslides said that 1,580 people had been evacuated and more than 300 houses damaged.
